Lower Property Tax Highlights Budget

The Village of Algonquin's proposed budget for the 2017-2018 fiscal year is balanced at \$19.6 million in the General Fund. This is down approximately 2 percent from last year's budget and maintains core service levels with continued investment

in our community's infrastructure. The reduced spending plan is driven primarily by a 2.3 percent property tax levy decrease approved by the Village Board in December. The Village of Algonquin's property tax rate ranks among the lowest for a municipality in the regional area. The Village receives approximately \$0.06 of every \$1.00 paid in property taxes with the remainder being paid to other taxing bodies.

"Cost-containment and tightly managed spending priorities will continue to drive our decision making in the years ahead" said Village President John Schmitt.

Algonquin Community Survey

In September 2016, the Algonquin Community Survey was sent to 1,500 randomly selected households in the community. Overall, the top quality of life measures in the Village rated positively by residents include Algonquin as a place to live (94.4%), your neighborhood as a place to live (91.4%), shopping opportunities (90.1%), and cleanliness of Algonquin (89.5%). The overall response rate for the survey was 20.6%.

Spring Hydrant Flushing

As a regular maintenance practice, the Village of Algonquin flushes all fire hydrants throughout the Village twice a year. Spring hydrant flushing is performed in six different zones and will begin on April 17, concluding May 26. Residents are encouraged to avoid using water while hydrant flushing is taking place as temporary losses of water pressure and water discoloration may be possible. Groot Spring Cleanup

In April, the Village, along with Groot, will sponsor a Village-wide cleanup program for single-family residences and townhomes that currently receive residential refuse and recycling services. This program is to encourage residents to reduce fire hazards in their homes and to "spruce up" their neighborhoods. STICK-ERS ARE NOT REQUIRED FOR THIS SPECIAL PICKUP. Typical items to be discarded include toys, clothes, couches, beds, dressers, and patio furniture.

Groot will provide free collection of leaves and branches (tied in bundles which are not more than 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter) April 6 - April 14. Leaves must be placed in standard paper yardwaste bags or reusable containers that are clearly marked with a red "X." Place the bags or cans at the curb on your regular collection day. Leaves placed in loose piles will NOT be collected.

Grass clippings and other vardwaste will still require a collection sticker. Any bags or cans that contain leaves mixed with other yardwaste will also require a collection sticker. The stickers for garbage and yardwaste are interchangeable. Please contact Groot at 800-244-1977 with questions regarding leaf and brush collection.

Help Prevent Stormwater Pollution

The following are some tips to help prevent stormwater pollution and protect our natural resources in Algonquin:

1. Never dump anything down a storm drain. Always recycle used oil, antifreeze and other fluids. Fix oil leaks in your vehicles.

2. Wash your car at a commercial car wash rather than in the street or in your drive way. If you wash your car at home, wash it on your lawn.

3 Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. If you use these chemicals, follow directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rainstorm. Compost or mulch lawn clippings.

4. Pick up after your pets and keep animals out of streams. Scoop up your pets waste and properly dispose of it.
