Presidential Park Reopens After Major Renovation

The Village of Algonquin has completed a \$6.74 million transformation of Presidential Park, located at 700 Highland Avenue, reimagining the 12-acre space as a vibrant, inclusive destination for recreation, wellness, and community events. New amenities include a sports-themed playground, outdoor fitness equipment, Ninja Warrior-style play structures, soccer fields, walking trails, and three turf baseball and softball fields designed for local leagues and regional tournaments. These features enhance recreational opportunities and are expected to boost local economic growth by attracting visiting teams and families to Algonquin's east side.

FY 25/26 Budget Approved

On April 15, 2025, the Village Board unanimously approved the Fiscal Year 2025–2026 Budget for the Village of Algonquin. The approved \$85.0 million budget serves as a strategic tool to guide decision-making and ensure the effective delivery of public services. The FY25/26 budget maintains core service levels and continues investment in critical infrastructure improvements.

\$1.2M Grant to Fund Sandbloom Road Upgrades

The Village of Algonquin has been awarded \$1.2 million through the Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP), a competitive grant administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation. This funding will support critical pedestrian and roadway improvements along Sandbloom Road.

The planned project includes the rehabilitation of 1.2 miles of roadway, upgraded drainage with new curb and gutter, replacement of a failing culvert at Souwanas Creek, and the extension of a multi-use path from Souwanas Trail to IL-62. These enhancements aim to improve safety, accessibility, and connectivity for all users.

Preliminary engineering is underway in 2025, with construction expected in the coming years. For more information on local infrastructure improvements, visit www.algonquin.org/construction.

Every Drop Counts: Water Conservation Regulations

The Village of Algonquin would like to remind residents the importance of water conservation and how to save water. Simple ideas for saving water include covering your swimming pool when not using it, doing only full loads of dishes/clothes, turning off water when brushing your teeth, watering landscaping early morning or at night, using a rain barrel, setting your mower blades higher and fixing leaks right away. The Village reminds you that summer watering restrictions are in place. To check current water system status, see signs posted on primary streets in the Village, call us at 847-658-2700, or look on the Village's website www.algonquin.org/waterstatus.

CONSERVATION: Green signs indicate outside water use is permitted except for watering landscaping and lawns which is prohibited between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

EVEN/ODD: Yellow signs indicate even/odd days for watering before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.

EVEN/ODD 6:00-9:00 A.M.: Orange signs indicate even/odd days for watering only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.

RESTRICTED: Red signs indicate no outside water use is allowed at any time. This includes all use of water outside, such as washing vehicles, power washing, and watering landscaping.
