### **Groot Awarded Residential Solid Waste Contract**

In June, the Village Board approved a five-year agreement with Groot for residential refuse, recycling, and yard waste collection services. Earlier in the year, the Village issued a request for proposals and Groot was the lowest cost respondent who met the proposal criteria that maintains existing services.

Algonquin's collection program will continue to be volume based and provide free curbside recycling services. The annual spring cleanup and fall drop-off events will also continue similar to their existing formats.

Groot will begin providing services on September 1, 2014. Over the next few months, Groot will mail residents information about their program and the transition as it relates to stickers, carts, collection schedule, and other pertinent information. #### **FY 14/15 Budget**

On April 1, 2014, the Village Board unanimously approved the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 annual budget for the Village of Algonquin. The Village's \$39 million budget is used as a tool to assist Village officials in making sound and rational choices for the provision of public services. # **Tree City USA**

The Arbor Day Foundation announced that the Village of Algonquin is again named a Tree City USA community for its commitment to urban forestry. This is the 18th year in which Algonquin has received this designation.

"We are always grateful to be recognized for the quality of our urban forestry program," stated John Schmitt, Village President. "Algonquin's tree-lined streets add significantly to the quality of life in our Village."

Algonquin has met the four standards to become a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA communities must have a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, a community forestry program with annual expenditures of at least \$2.00 per capita, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation. # **Every Drop Counts - Water Conservation Regulations**

In May, Village staff visited local elementary schools where students learned the importance of water conservation and how to save water. Simple ideas for saving water include covering your swimming pool when not using it, doing only full loads of dishes/clothes, turning off water when brushing your teeth, watering landscaping early morning or at night, using a rain barrel, setting your mower blades higher and fixing leaks right away. The Village reminds you that summer watering restrictions are in place. To check current water system status, see signs posted on primary streets in the Village, call us at 847-658-2700, or look on the Village's website www.algonquin.org. CONSERVATION: Green signs indicate outside water use is permitted except for watering landscaping and lawns which is pro-

EVEN/ODD: Yellow signs indicate even/odd days for watering before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. EVEN/ODD 6:00-9:00 A.M.: Orange signs indicate even/odd days for watering only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days from 6:00 a.m to 9:00 a.m.

RESTRICTED: Red signs indicate no outside water use is allowed at any time. This includes all use of water outside, such as washing vehicles, power washing, and watering landscaping.

#### **Construction Info**

Following are a few of the major construction projects happening in Algonquin this summer:

Western Bypass (IL Route 31): Work is concluding on the construction of 2.11 miles of a four-lane divided highway, diamond interchange, four new bridges, retaining walls and noise abatement walls west of downtown Algonquin, with project completion scheduled for late this summer.

Copper Oaks Subdivision (Phase 1): Work includes rehabilitation of the roadway system in a portion of the Copper Oaks Subdivision. Project is expected to be completed in September.
