Free CFL Bulbs

The Village of Algonquin has been given 5,000 Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) bulbs by the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus to distribute free of charge

to anyone who lives in the Village of Algonquin. Each Algonquin household can receive two CFL bulbs by visiting either Village Hall (2200 Harnish Drive) or the Public Works Facility (110 Meyer Drive) while supplies last.



Water Conservation...

Every Drop Counts





Summer is upon us again. With the warm, dry weather comes high demand for water, particularly for out-door uses. Water is a very valuable resource that can quickly dry up during the summer months if we are not careful to limit our usage. To combat excessive water usage, the Village has set up policies that encourage us to save water.

You can help conserve water by setting mower blades high, using mulch around trees and plants to retain moisture, aiming sprinklers to only water plants and not the pavement, and using drip irrigation systems. You can also conserve water indoors by turning off the water while brushing your teeth, checking for and immediately fixing leaks, taking a short shower instead of a bath, washing only full loads of dishes and clothes, installing water-efficient showerheads and appliances, and installing displacement devices in toilets.

The water status system adjusts based on the seasons and the weather. The Village has a zero-tolerance policy for water violations and follows the system strictly. Those watering illegally will be fined \$100 for the first offense. If you have any questions regarding this policy, please visit www.algonquin.org. To check the water system status, watch the signs which are posted along major streets, call Village Hall at 847-658-2700, or look on the Village website at www.algonquin.org. The water system status definitions are:



Signs are posted throughout the Village indicating the current water status.

- Conservation: Green signs indicate outside water use is permitted except for watering landscaping and lawns, which is prohibited between the hours of 9:00am and 6:00pm.
- Even/Odd: Yellow signs indicate even/odd days for watering before 9:00am and after 6:00pm. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days, before 9:00am and after 6:00pm.
- Even/Odd 6:00-9:00 AM: Orange signs indicate even/odd days for watering only between the hours of 6:00am and 9:00am. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days from 6:00am to 9:00am.
- Restricted: Red signs indicate no outside water use is allowed at any time. This includes all use of water outside, such as washing vehicles, power washing, and watering landscaping.

Thank you in advance for doing your part to help conserve water. Remember, "Every Drop Counts!"
