#### **Downtown Construction Starts in August**

Preliminary work for the Downtown Algonquin redevelopment project is set to begin in August. This work will include overhead utility relocation along Main Street from Edward Street south to IL-31/Prairie Trail. Overhead utilities will be

undergrounded to allow for future streetscape, pedestrian, and lighting improvements on the surface of Main Street. Additionally, starting in the winter months, water main and sanitary sewer replacement work will be performed on this section of road as part of a total of \$6.3 million of improvements scheduled for the upcoming year.

Work will be performed on a block-by-block basis, with intermittent traffic and parking restrictions in place. Up-to-date construction details will be available online at www.algonquin.org/construction as the project progresses. Access to area businesses will be maintained throughout the duration of construction. Please consider supporting local businesses during construction.



Please area will occur in phases over the next several years.

# FY 17/18 Budget

On April 4, 2017, the Village Board unanimously approved the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 annual budget for the Village of Algonquin. The Village's \$49.1 million budget is used as a tool to assist Village officials in making sound and rational choices for the provision of public services. # **Every Drop Counts: Water Conservation Regulations**

In May, Village staff visited local elementary schools where students learned the importance of water conservation and how to save water. Simple ideas for saving water include covering your swimming pool when not using it, doing only full loads of dishes/clothes, turning off water when brushing your teeth, watering landscaping early morning or at night, using a rain barrel, setting your mower blades higher and fixing leaks right away. The Village reminds you that summer watering restrictions are in place. To check current water system status, see signs posted on primary streets in the Village, call us at 847-658-2700, or look on the Village's website www.algonquin.org.

**<u>CONSERVATION</u>**: Green signs indicate outside water use is permitted except for watering landscaping and lawns which is prohibited between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

**EVEN/ODD:** Yellow signs indicate even/odd days for watering before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. **EVEN/ODD 6:00 0:00 A M : Orange** signs indicate even (add days for watering and between the barres of 6:00 p.m.

**EVEN/ODD 6:00-9:00 A.M.:** Orange signs indicate even/odd days for watering only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.

**RESTRICTED:** *Red* signs indicate no outside water use is allowed at any time. This includes all use of water outside, such as washing vehicles, power washing, and watering landscaping.
