Old Town Algonquin Construction Moving Ahead

In February of 2018, construction began transforming Main Street into a beautiful, pedestrian friendly environment while helping to preserve the character and history of the area. This phase of construction will last through the year and include updated utilities, street improvements and enhanced pedestrian amenities.

STORES AND RESTAURANTS ARE OPEN DURING CONSTRUCTION. Main Street access and parking options are available for the community to patronize local businesses. Visitors may use the free parking lot at Washington Street and Harrison Street.

Underground water and sewer utility work is on-going in the area. Access to local businesses will be available during the entire project.

FY 18/19 Budget

On April 17, 2018, the Village Board unanimously approved the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 annual budget for the Village of Algonquin. The Village's \$56.1 million budget is used as a tool to assist Village officials in making sound and rational choices for the provision of public services.

Every Drop Counts: Water Conservation Regulations

In May, Village staff visited local elementary schools where students learned the importance of water conservation and how to save water. Simple ideas for saving water include covering your swimming pool when not using it, doing only full loads of dishes/clothes, turning off water when brushing your teeth, watering landscaping early morning or at night, using a rain barrel, setting your mower blades higher and fixing leaks right away. The Village reminds you that summer watering restrictions are in place. To check current water system status, see signs posted on primary streets in the Village, call us at 847-658-2700, or look on the Village's website www.algonquin.org.

<u>CONSERVATION:</u> *Green* signs indicate outside water use is permitted except for watering landscaping and lawns which is prohibited between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

EVEN/ODD: Yellow signs indicate even/odd days for watering before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days before 9:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.

EVEN/ODD 6:00-9:00 A.M.: *Orange* signs indicate even/odd days for watering only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. Even addresses may only water on even calendar days, and odd addresses may only water on odd calendar days from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.

RESTRICTED: *Red* signs indicate no outside water use is allowed at any time. This includes all use of water outside, such as washing vehicles, power washing, and watering landscaping.
