Algonquin Rolls Out Bicycle Rack Art Contest Winners

This spring you will see artistic bicycle racks being placed around the Village. The ECO-Committee and the Public Arts Commission collaborated on a bicycle rack art contest. The call for artists was announced in December 2009. The Vil-

lage received 20 submittals (15 signature racks and 5 standard racks). The quality and creativity of the designs was very impressive, and 3 signature racks and 3 standard rack designs were selected to be constructed. The selected artists will be fabricating their winning designs and submitting the completed bicycle racks to the Village early this spring.

Once all racks have been installed, the Village will release a new bicycle map highlighting all the paths within the community and the location of the new bike rack art pieces. The Village is currently working with businesses to solicit sponsorship of more bicycle racks. At time of publication, Algonquin Commons has generously sponsored the bicycle rack art program. Recycle "50 in 2010"

Since 2004, the Village with the help of Waste Management, has been tracking refuse and recycling statistics in the Village. An important indicator the Village tracks is our diversion ratio - the amount of refuse diverted from landfills by recycling. Between 2004 and 2009, Village residents recycled 43% of their waste. This rate is one of the highest in the Chicago region!

Our goal for 2010 is to divert 50% of our waste from landfills by recycling. With your help, we can continue to be a regional leader in recycling!


Village Board Meeting Time Changed to 7:30 pm

Tree Mulching Techniques

Mulches are materials placed over the soil surface to maintain moisture and improve soil conditions. Mulching is one of the most beneficial things a homeowner can do for the health of a tree. Mulch can reduce water loss from the soil, minimize weed competition, and improve soil structure. Mulch must be applied properly; if it is too deep or if the wrong material is used, it can actually cause significant harm to trees and other landscape plants.

Organic mulches are ideal for mulching applications and include wood chips, pine needles, hardwood and softwood bark, cocoa hulls (may be toxic to pets), leaves, compost mixes, and a variety of other products usually derived from plants. Organic mulches decompose in the landscape at different rates depending on the material. Those that decompose faster must be replenished more often. Because the decomposition process improves soil quality and fertility, many arborists and other landscape professionals consider this a positive characteristic, despite the added maintenance.

As beneficial as mulch is, too much can be harmful. The generally recommended mulching depth is 2 to 4 inches. Unfortunately, North American landscapes are falling victim to a plague of over-mulching. A new term, "mulch volcanoes," has emerged to describe mulch that has been piled up around the base of trees. Top dressing with new mulch annually (often for the sake of refreshing the color) creates a buildup to depths that can be unhealthy. Deep mulch can be effective in suppressing weeds and reducing maintenance, but it often causes additional problems. Please contact the Public Works Department at 847-658-2754 for more information.

Spring Cleanup Schedule

In April, the Village, along with Waste Management, will sponsor a Village-wide cleanup program for single-family residences and townhomes that currently receive residential refuse and recycling services. This program is to encourage residents to reduce fire hazards in their homes and to "spruce up" their neighborhoods. STICKERS ARE NOT RE-QUIRED FOR THIS SPECIAL PICKUP. Typical items to be discarded include toys, old clothes, couches, beds, dressers, grills, and patio furniture. Items that will not be picked up include automobile parts, landscape waste, white goods, and construction materials such as broken concrete and large amounts of lumber and brick. Free Leaf/Brush Collection

Waste Management will provide free collection of leaves and branches (tied in bundles that are not more than 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter) between April 5 and April 30, 2010. Leaves must be placed in standard paper yardwaste bags or reusable containers that are clearly marked with a red "X." Place the bags or cans at the curb on your regular collection day. Leaves placed in loose piles will NOT be picked up. Grass clippings and other yardwaste will still require a collection sticker. Any bags or cans that contain leaves mixed with other yardwaste will also require a collection sticker. The stickers for garbage and yardwaste are interchangeable. Cemetery Spring Cleanup

The annual "Spring Cleanup" of the Algonquin Cemetery will begin Monday, April 5, through Friday, April 9. All decorations that are not removed before April 1, 2010 will be discarded so that the Village may begin appropriate seasonal care for the site. Beginning Monday, April 19, through Friday, April 23, the spring cleanup will be completed and mowing of the cemetery will begin.

Mother's Day and/or summer decorations may be placed on graves beginning Saturday, May 1. Remember, no planting may be done in Blocks 8 or 9 of the cemetery. No planting of bushes or shrubs, etc. may be done in any part of the cemetery, except by authority of the Village.

2010 Census

The 2010 Decennial Census is upon us. The goal of the U.S. Census Bureau, is to meet constitutional and legislative requirements to count the U.S. population. The decennial census process is the largest domestic undertaking in the United States. In an effort to accurately count the population, census questionnaires will be delivered either by hand or mail to residents, beginning in February 2010. Through late August 2010, Census Bureau temporary field staff will work in neighborhoods across the United States to deliver questionnaires, collect information from those who have not returned their census questionnaire, and verify addresses. All Census Bureau employees are issued identification cards that identify them as such.

The data produced from the decennial census are used to reapportion the seats of the U.S. House of Representatives and realign the boundaries of the legislative districts of each state. Census data also are used to allocate more than \$400 billion each year in federal financial assistance and to provide a social, demographic, and economic profile of the nation's people. This profile assists in guiding policy decisions at each level of government. Make sure you are counted so the Village of Algonquin receives its fair share! Click It or Ticket

The Algonquin Police Department will be conducting safety belt enforcement zones throughout the Village from May 14 through May 31 as part of the national "Click It or Ticket" seatbelt campaign. The goal of the "Click It or Ticket" mobilization is not to give out tickets but rather to influence drivers and passengers to buckle up and prevent injuries and fatalities.

In 2009, over 1,000 people lost their lives in motor vehicle accidents in Illinois. Many of those lives could have been saved if they had worn their safety belt. Illinois is one of only ten states with a seat belt compliance rate of 90% or more, and Algonquin has a compliance rate of 95%; however, more can be done. Of those people killed in motor vehicle crashes between midnight and 6:00 am, 73% were improperly restrained, and, after midnight, a driver is five times more likely to be involved in an accident involving alcohol. Because of this, the Algonquin Police Department will also be targeting impaired drivers in conjunction with our nighttime seat belt enforcement zones.

The "Click It or Ticket" mobilization plays a critical role in the effort to keep people safe on our roads. The Algonquin Police Department is a proud proponent of saving lives by encouraging motorists to buckle up.

Emerald Ash Borer Update

The expected infestation of ash trees by the emerald ash borer (EAB) continues to develop. EAB is a devastating insect which is relatively new to us and will most likely eliminate the ash species as a viable plant in our area. Presently, the Village has identified just over 200 Village-owned trees that are infested. All of these trees have either been removed or are slated for removal. It is our expectation that this spring, our infestation will continue to dramatically increase.

Treatment options available include homeowner products available at local retailers or treatments provided by qualified arborists. The only product endorsed by the Illinois Department of Agriculture is Tree-age, which is only commercially available and must be applied by a professional. Please be advised that if you have an ash tree you wish to preserve, you should start treatments immediately and as prescribed for the life of the tree.

Construction Zone

The following are Village construction projects that are currently in progress or planned in the near future. Please visit the Village Construction Projects page at www.algonquin.org for additional information.

North Harrison Street - Algonquin Hills Subdivision

North Harrison Street will be reconstructed from just north of Ericson Marine property north to the Village limits. This project is scheduled to begin in summer 2010.

Hanson Road Reconstruction

The project is near completion on the portion of the road-way between Edgewood Drive and Huntington Drive. In early spring, the roadway will be closed in this section in order to safely complete the bike path, restoration, sidewalks, and various other improvements. It is expected to be closed for six weeks, at which point work on the intersection of Huntington Drive will begin. This will involve a full closure of the intersection at Huntington Drive, which should last approximately six weeks.

Ratt Creek Tributary Restoration

The finishing touches on the riparian corridor adjacent to Edgewood Drive will be completed in early spring. The native plantings will be installed, along with the completion of grading and seeding.

Old Oak Terrace Subdivision

Old Oak Circle, Plymouth Court, Maplewood Lane, and Kingsbury Court will be resurfaced as part of the roadway restoration project. A small amount of curb work, sidewalk, and apron will also be included in the project that is schedule to start in the spring.

Additional projects may be completed should federal funding become available.

Sump Pump and Downspout Discharge

With the spring rains approaching, the Village would like to remind residents that the discharge from a sump pump or roof drainage downspout shall not discharge directly or indirectly on or over any public street, sidewalk, bike path, or right-of-way. This is especially crucial during winter months when icing becomes a concern. In addition, the outlet of a sump pump discharge hose shall not be located within five feet of any property line, nor shall such discharge be cause for standing water on any adjacent property. Tornado Information

The days are getting longer and the mercury is slowly climbing. Before you know it, all of the pleasantries of spring will be here, and most of us can't wait. But before we get busy with spring activities, we should all stop and plan for some of the other events that spring springs upon us - tornado season. Although tornadoes have occurred in each month of the year in Illinois, most occur between April 1 and June 30. Illinois averages about 42 tornados a year, but record numbers have occurred in recent years - 120 in 2003 and 124 in 2006.

With the arrival of the railroad in 1855, the first significant wave of prosperity and development took place in the Village. Since the primary occupation of area settlers was dairy farming, dairy-related business and industries were among the first to develop. On the site immediately south of the railroad depot and west of Main Street, a cheese factory was constructed in the 1870's, producing cheese from the milk provided by the local dairy farmers. The factory operated for a period of nearly 20 years until 1890, when it was struck by lightning and burned to the ground.

On this site, a factory to produce condensed milk was then erected which was acquired by the Borden Milk Company. The new factory employed 75 people and processed the milk from over 1,500 local cows. The factory continued to be the town's largest employer for the next several decades.

During Algonquin's devastating fire on August 16, 1895, which burned nearly half of the west side of Main Street, the water reservoir and fire hydrant at the Borden factory provided the water to fight the blaze. The Borden factory had the only fire hydrant in the entire Village at the time. The factory eventually closed as much of the dairy industry moved to Wisconsin. The building was demolished in 1930, and the property then became the site of the E. M. Melahn Construction Company until the 1990's. The site is currently vacant and is located on the west side of South Main Street between Huntington Drive and the Prairie Path Bike Trail.

Hydrant Flushing Schedule

As a regular maintenance practice, the Village of Algonquin Utilities Division flushes all fire hydrants throughout the Village twice a year. This exercise not only ensures proper operation of each hydrant but helps to move fresh water throughout the distribution system, improving overall water quality. Weather permitting, the spring hydrant flushing schedule is as follows:

March 22 - March 28: The entire area east of Main Street (IL Route 31). This area also includes the Arrowhead Subdivision, Jefferson Street, Railroad Street, and Washington Street.

March 29 - April 4: The area north of Edgewood Drive, east of Hanson Road, south of Algonquin Road, and west of Main Street (IL Route 31).

April 5 - April 11: The area south of Edgewood Drive and County Line Road, west of Main Street (IL Route 31), and east of Randall Road.

April 12 - April 18: The area east of Randall Road, south of Algonquin Road, west of Hanson Road, and north of County Line Road. This includes Randall Road.

April 19 - April 25: The area west of Square Barn Road to Village limits.

April 26 - May 7: The area east of Square Barn Road, west of Randall Road, and south of Algonquin Road.

Daylight Saving Time

It's that time of the year again! Don't forget to set your clocks ahead one hour at 2:00 am, on Sunday, March 14.

This is also a good time to change the batteries in the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home. Although 90% of households have smoke detectors in their homes, one-third are estimated to have dead or missing batteries.
