Yellowstone Natural Area Wins EPA Award

The Village of Algonquin, along with the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in Chicago and Chicago Wilderness, is pleased to announce that the Village of Algonquin is a recipient of the Conservation and Native Landscaping Award for its work at the Yellowstone Natural Area.

Yellowstone Natural Area was an existing 4-acre turf grass detention basin. In spring 2007 it was retrofitted and planted with native vegetation. The basin is now a well-established prairie that infiltrates and cleans stormwater from the surrounding residential development. The adjacent 3-acre oak woodland was highly degraded. Intensive brush cutting, controlled burning, and over seeding has greatly enhanced the oak woodland. The entire project site is now a low maintenance native landscape which provides beautiful aesthetics, wildlife habitat, and overall water quality benefits. The Yellowstone Natural Area is located at Yellowstone Park, 1420 Yellowstone Parkway, in Algonquin.

E-Waste Recycling Event

The Village will hold an E-Waste Recycling Event on May 14 between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. This event is open to all Village of Algonquin residents. Bring your qualifying electronics that you no longer want or use to the Algonquin Public Works Facility, 110 Meyer Drive.

Electronics that qualify for this event and will be taken at no charge include desktop PCs, laptop PCs, monitors (CRT & LCD), keyboards, mice, cords, cables (power, USB, etc.), hard drives, miscellaneous computer components, CD-ROM drives, zip drives, tape drives, printers, televisions, console televisions, VCRs, DVD players, handheld electronic organizers, handheld games, video game players, joysticks/games controls, cameras (film and digital), camcorders, radios, stereos, portable CD players, typewriters, word processors, fax machines, scanners, telephones, microwaves, toasters, and pagers. Items that are NOT included in this recycling effort include, but are not limited to: white goods (refrigerators, stoves, freezers, dishwashers, dryers, air conditioner units, and other appliances labeled as such), medical waste products, and rubber-based items.

Spring Cleanup

In April, the Village, along with Waste Management, will sponsor a Village-wide cleanup program for single-family residences and townhomes that currently receive residential refuse and recycling services. This program is to encourage residents to reduce fire hazards in their homes and to "spruce up" their neighborhoods. STICKERS ARE NOT REQUIRED FOR THIS SPECIAL PICKUP. Typical items to be discarded include toys, old clothes, couches, beds, dressers, grills, and patio furniture. Free Leaf & Brush Collection

Waste Management will provide free collection of leaves and branches (tied in bundles which are not more than 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter) April 4 - April 29. Leaves must be placed in standard paper yardwaste bags or reusable containers that are clearly marked with a red "X." Place the bags or cans at the curb on your regular collection day. Leaves placed in loose piles will NOT be collected.

Historic Algonquin Walking Tour

The Historic Commission is pleased to announce its new Old Town Algonquin Self-Guided Walking Tour Brochure will be released this May and will feature dozens of architecturally and historically significant local sites and structures. The walking tour brochure will be formally unveiled at a series of kick-off events in May, in celebration of National Historic Preservation Month.
